Sunday Reflection

Christ the King In the <u>Gospel</u> Reading, Christ is crucified. The rulers who caused this crucifixion feel no compassion. They add to his misery by mocking his mission: he saved others; himself he cannot save. One of the two thieves crucified with him mocks him too: Hey, Christ, save yourself and us!



Christ the King says nothing. He just hangs there, nailed to the wood of the cross. The other thief rebukes the first thief, the one mocking Jesus, in the strongest possible way. "Have you no fear of God?"

If you leaned over the edge

of your chair and saw a giant python inching its way across your floor, you would leap sky high, wouldn't you? You wouldn't be making any mocking jokes right then, would you? The good thief wants to get the same reaction out of the bad mocking thief. Only it isn't a python that is meant to give the bad thief a reality check. It's the awesome power of the living God.

But how about a reality check for the good thief? Look at where Christ the King is!

The whole earth is soaked with the tears of the suffering; and broken humanity of Jesus is like the floating debris of a ship everywhere on the ocean of history. What's to fear about God? Where is he? On the cross—that is the answer. God is love and all the power of God is there in the love shown by Christ's painful death. To save us, and to bring us to himself in heaven, God will suffer even the torment of death on the cross. Love that is willing to suffer is greater than power that is able to coerce, and that powerful love is there on the cross.

Someone habituated to mockery *should* fear this power. Sooner or later, the consuming fire of God's love will burn away his mockery's pretense at insouciance.

But someone who fears God because God loves him will find Christ in the way the good thief did. Sooner or later, he will hear Christ say to him, "This day you will be with me in paradise." Then he will know the victory of Christ the King, and he will be victorious with Christ.

Advent begins next week. It is known by many as the "Forgotten Season." Why?

Because we are already into the Christmas Season. Advent should be the time to reflect and prepare us not for the Christ Child, as that is Christmas but for Jesus' 2nd coming. Advent has also been called "Little Lent. A time to prepare ourselves for this coming by sacrifice and penance,

Pope Francis spoke about the start of Advent during an audience with a group of about 6,500 people from the Italian dioceses of Ugento-Santa Maria di Leuca and Molfetta-Ruvo-Giovinazzo-Terlizzi in the Paul VI Hall.

Pope Francis thanked the travelers for coming, recalling that he had visited their diocese on a daytrip. "But God," he pointed out, "will visit you where I cannot come, in your homes, in your lives. God visits us and waits to

stay with us forever."

In his speech, the pope referenced Servant of God Fr. Tonino Bello, who was the bishop of the Diocese of Molfetta-Ruvo-Giovinazzo-Terlizzi from 1982-1993.

Don Tonino once reflected, he said, on the fact that life is full of fear: "Fear of neighbor... fear of the other... fear of violence... fear of not making it. Fear of not being accepted... fear that it is useless to work hard. Fear, much, that we cannot change the world... Fear of not finding a job."

Pope Francis pointed out that Don Tonino would respond to this gloomy scenario by saying that "Advent responds with 'the Gospel of anti-fear.'"

"If fear makes you lie on the ground, the Lord invites you to get up; if negativity pushes you to look down, Jesus invites us to turn our gaze to heaven, from where He will come. Because we are not children of fear, but children of God," the pope said.

"Then we welcome the invitation of the Gospel, the invitation so often repeated by Don Tonino to stand up, to get up," he continued. "From where? From the sofas of life: from the comfort that makes you lazy, from the mundanity that makes you sick inside, from the self-pity that darkens."

"Stand up, let us look up to the sky," he instructed. "We would also advise of the need to open our hands to our neighbor. And the consolation that we can give will heal our fears."
